Delta Gamma Chapter Minutes

September 13, 2014

The Delta Gamma meeting was preceded by the Annual Joint Chapter Meeting. After a welcome by Tracy Bell, Annetta Andrews gave an inspirational reading focused on giving genuine compliments to support meaningful relationships with students and others. Gerry Larson presented information on the nine recipients of teacher grants and introduced two of the winners. Jennifer Allen, an art teacher in the Person County Schools, used her grant to purchase digital cameras for student use in a self-portrait project. Shai Cullop, a language arts teacher at Brogden Middle School, purchased books for a class-room library.

Guest speaker Dr. Barbara Perry-Sheldon, Eta State Executive Secretary, listed six tips from Santa for developing leadership and membership growth in chapters. Build a wonderful workshop. Make a list and check it twice. Listen to the elves. Share the milk and cookies. Look beyond the red wagon. Be good for goodness' sake.

Carolyn Vincent, Region V Director, reminded the group that all chapters will be asked to help with the Eta State Convention, which will take place in Chapel Hill on April 24-26, 2015, after which the four chapters retired to separate spaces.

Co-president Elaine Russell presided over the Delta Gamma meeting. She noted the Wow and Wishes poster on the wall, where members can list celebratory and aspirational items for our shared vision. The January 25, 2014 minutes were approved.

Joan East presented the treasurer's report and noted that the chapter will need at least \$800 for four grants to beginning teachers. A question was raised as to who will pay for the state convention. There is a budget in the state organization for convention expenses. More information will be available soon because Joan East will serve as convention treasurer and Judy Jones as convention registrar. A discussion followed as to whether to raise dues in order to cover expenses for co-presidents to attend training sessions, the state convention, etc. A decision on this matter was postponed until next spring.

Nancy Anderson announced that the chapter newsletters will appear in September, November, January, and March. It was suggested that she include a "Please Remember" section to highlight members who are ailing or grieving.

Sandy Poston announced the schedule of chapter meetings for the academic year. She noted that the January 17 meeting will feature a book discussion with Ann Wilder and Gerry Larson, plus a presentation by several members on their hobbies. She also discussed the fact that Claire Hudzinski is working on the chapter website. In order to comply with the state guidelines, each member will have to give permission for more than her name to appear on the state website. It was decided that no chapter member's personal information will be included on the state website, only her name. Nancy Anderson will send part of the newsletter to the state – minutes, treasurer's report, and program information – and members' personal news will be sent only to the membership.

Gerry Larson gave an update on the Schools for Africa project. In conjunction with UNICEF, more than 1000 schools in 13 countries received aid from this project. We are again being asked to fill Thirsty for Knowledge bottles with money and bring it to the January meeting. The chapter raised \$400 last year.

Elaine Russell discussed the importance of each member completing the Member Profile Sheet and turning them in to her.

Judy Jones suggested that the chapter create a scrapbook for certificates and other items to be kept for the long term. Kim May will create the scrapbook, with Gerry Larson's help.

Theresa Wahome-Tate reminded members to keep track of hours spent on supporting beginning teachers. The Educational Excellence Committee is collecting this information.

The meeting was adjourned. The next meeting will be on Saturday, November 1, at the West End Community Center, where we will learn about the Rebound program for suspended students.

Did you know that one of the DKG Founders...

- * collected folk ballads with her husband Mrs.Ruby Terrill Lomax
- * was petite, fashion-conscious and loved color and fun Dr. Cora M. Martin
- * taught Will Rogers and was an early advocate for Women's Rights -Mrs. Lalla M. Odom
- * was the 1st woman elected to statewide office in Texas- Dr. Annie Webb Blanton
- * believed that "idea + vision+faith+work= magic"- Miss Ray King
- * loved poetry and was a teller of original stories- Dr. Anna Hiss
- * brought laughter into any room she entered -Miss Mamie Sue Bastian
- * organized Beta Chapter in San Antonio only two months after DKG's founding -Miss Ruby Cole
- * was rated "Outstanding Teacher" by her students Miss Mabel Grizzard
- * died less than I year after the Society was organized Miss Sue King
- * believed that our Society could lessen factors that threaten our children Dr. Helen Koch
- * was a great listener who " welcomed differences in opinon, honored each person's view point, took time to analyze a speaker's remarks" Miss Lela Lee Williams

Did you know these interesting facts about our founder, Annie Webb Blanton?

She had a twin sister who died when they were twelve.



Annie Webb Blanton

After high school she taught in a one room school house and then in high school.

While teaching high school in Austin Texas, she worked toward her BA at the University of Texas. It took her nine years to earn her BA.

She earned her doctorate from Cornell in rural education and sociology then returned in 1927 to teach at the University of Texas.

She was the first woman to be elected president of the Texas State Teachers Association.

The Texas State Woman Suffrage Association sponsored her candidacy for State Superintendent of Public Instruction which she won in 1918 . She was the first woman elected to public office in Texas.

With 11 of her friends, she founded DKG in 1929. Twelve years later the Society had expanded to 35 states and 80 chapters....and the rest is history of which we are a part.






"Learn by Doing It Yourself"
